- Educate and elevate by sharing stories of trailblazing Caribbean Americans—like Shirley Chisholm (first Black woman elected to U.S. Congress), Colin Powell, Celia Cruz, or Audra McDonald.
- Create space for dialogue around identity, migration, colorism, and cultural pride within and beyond the Caribbean diaspora.

June's DEI celebrations are a vivid reminder of our shared humanity and the richness that comes from embracing all identities.
